Dr. Pillai commenced his speech by saying that we are called to respond to the ecological crisis now engulfing the world as never before. He dwelt at length on the challenges facing humanity. The words Renew and and Restore implies that we have lost something vital. The church is in dire need for reformation. The church is the microcosm of the world.

Creation is an expression of God's Divine Grace. The planet has been created by God to be shared by all. As God loves and cares for all creation we too must love and care His creation. Human beings are stewards of everything God has conferred on us.

Dr. Pillai's powerful message reminded us of the cardinal principle of Christian faith that God's love extends to all creatures in the Oikumene (inhabited earth).



The Spirit of Ecumenism in the Opening Worship

The first day of CCA General Assembly Meet perches as the leading light for the further events/days to follow. Remembering the mercies granted by God and celebration of people of faith, the opening worship united all people in the spirit of ecumenism.

With the echoes of drum rolls, a procession displaying the diversity and symbolic representations of light, cross and scripture— the worship began. The congregation tuned to the symphony sung by the choir as they joined voices proclaiming "we are the household gathered round Jesus, sharing one table, one cup and one light".

The elements of worship were beautifully incorporated with dance and songs to raise praise and prayers to God. The reading of the scripture was taken from Romans 8:18-28.

Rev. Idan Topno, an ordained clergy of the Gossner Evangelical Lutheran Church of Chotanagpur and Assam & a theological professor from Jharkhand, India, shared the message of renewal and restoration of creation inducing justice for all creation. She highlighted the forestories of the Adivasi community facing manifold issues concerning Jal, Jungle and Jamin literally translating to Wa-

ter, Forest and Land. She used the scripture to press upon the spiritual bankruptcy and lack of life in abundance. Yet, highlighting the remnants of unspoken harmony between humans and environment.

This ecumenical worship set the tone for the Assembly hoisting the flag of justice and awakening that leads to restoration and renewal of all.

Churcha Sessions on Fifteen Topics



VAARTHA

n its God-guided passage over time, the CCA has been able to focus on areas of concerns affecting the society from time to time in various ways. The theme of the 15th General assembly in Kottayam is "God Renew us in Your Spirit and Restore Creation"

A very special feature of the present General Assembly is a session by name Churcha. The word Churcha in Malayalam and certain other local languages mean discussion. The word also alludes to conversation, sharing of thoughts, opinion, concerns and so on. It is a deliberative and discursive session which provides a genuine space for theological deliberations and discussions on emerging theological , socio-political and other concerns.

Fifteen topics have been identified by the CCA to be taken up in the Churcha sessions. At the time of registration for participation in the Assembly, all delegates were asked to select any three of the fifteen topics which were close to their hearts, and in which their expertise and interest lay. In this way it was possible to bring these 15 topics in to thought process of all delegates and make them specially ponder over three areas in the list.

Another important decision of the CCA leadership was to ensure the participation of Seminary students from the four Theological Seminaries in Kerala; the Orthodox, Jacobite, Mar Thoma and KUT Seminaries. Twenty students each have been recommended by the four Seminaries for participation in the programme. This makes possible for the young students to be aware of developments in areas of concern in our society and to be vigilant about these.

The Churcha sessions are therefore attended by the delegates to the General Assembly as well as selected Seminary students. Since the topics of the Churcha sessions were announced sufficiently early and made known to the participants, it becomes possible for them to prepare for these discussions earnestly.

The Churcha Sessions are being held on October 1st Sunday afternoon in three different venues in Kottayam viz. The Orthodox Theological seminary, Mar Thoma Theological Seminary and CMS College Kottayam. Eminent Theologians have been assigned to lead each session.
